As you will look at this report, other than local emergencies, we were blessed not to have any severe natural disasters as were experienced in other states. We have several certified trained members who trained in their units. Several units had the Red Cross come to their post homes and demonstrate life-saving techniques. The units also hosted blood drives. Our Juniors actually held a membership workshop to learn more about disaster preparedness at home and at school.

The members of California continue to present the Blue Star Banners at their meetings to new members. Having such a large population of military members and their loved ones being deployed, they also had special ceremonies. They invited the entire family to come. They all received a Blue Star Banner. Following the ceremony there were lunches and dinners offered.

We did have one unit present a Gold Star Banner to a mother who had lost her son. It was a beautiful ceremony giving the respect and dignity to that veteran and their family well deserved. Following the presentation there was a dinner in his honor.

At our Girls State program, they have promoted a group called the Blue Star Banner Girls. This is comprised of girls that have loved ones that are serving. It is a great opportunity for these girls to share their feelings with others that truly understand. They all received a Blue Star Banner along with a pin.

This Chairman was not advised of any MIA remains being found and returned this year, but we do have a beautiful ceremony that's done every year during the POW/MIA Remembrance Week. At this ceremony a representative from the POW/MIA organization always does a presentation on the remains that have been found. They have who they are and they will be returned to their loved ones.

One unit did a beautiful POW/MIA remembrance table. It was dedicated to a World War II pilot who has never been found. The entire family was invited to share their stories and take pictures with their loved one.

California has several ways that they have honored members coming home and deploying. Service members coming home and deploying. California American Legion Riders go out in mass to meet and greet soldiers that are coming home or deploying. And sometimes, unfortunately, they are called to escort servicemen who have given the ultimate sacrifice to their country. They have a calling tree, and it doesn't matter what time day or night, if they get the call, they all meet to ride.

Several units reported also greeting soldiers and giving welcome back home packs filled with socks, underwear, toilets -- can I say underwear? Toilets, snack bars, fruit, candies and water to get them through when they actually get back home. Many soldiers have nothing except what they have on and in their duffle bag. When they get back to bases sometimes in the middle of the night, there is nothing open for them to get a snack or water or anything, so these backpacks are greatly appreciated.

Units reported working with other post families offering barbecues, to serve in events such as welcoming home soldiers. They also did the same for those who were deploying. They make sure that they have membership tables at all of these events so they can talk about who we are and what we do to help them and their families. During these conversations they mention that they will be shipping off -- if they mention they'll be shipping off to the location, we are prepared to tell them about the benefits of joining and being able to transfer when they get started, when they get settled in their new area.

Units reported that they found out about soldiers deploying and seeking out those families involved. Support networks of family readiness groups and to offer while their loved one is deployed. These ladies offer to baby sit so that the moms can go to school at night or the dads, take care of their animals if they're gone or anything that happens, help that loved one who is at home to feel that there is someone out there who still cares.

Coupon clipping is huge. I mean huge in California. We had clipping over \$895,483.50. They have been sent to commissaries all over the world. One unit felt very special when they received notes and thank yous from the Netherlands and also from South Korea.

Units reported that they donated to local food pantries where they can go on exclusive days reserved for them to get help to get the food they don't have. The ROTC program is very active in California with 27 units participating and 84 members volunteering over 597 hours and donating over 2,810 towards the program.

Anyway, I had I came across one of my papers from Dave Levee when he was the editor. And it says here you have two pages in every issue and at -- and at no cost to the Auxiliary. If you do not want to have a copy in the issue, please let me know 15 days prior to, blah, blah. But it said -- get to the part where it says -- okay. This one I knew because I read for what we paid for it was pretty much everything, every submission, every printing, every mailing and everything.

So it continues to be bottom line our mail, our postage. That is what is so high. And, you know, we do -- I don't know whether you want this in a vote. Do we continue to just look at finding a cheaper way to do it. Do we just find a way to do something in our own office in membership. Because I did get a card from somebody actually who came up and gave me her card and said that she does her thing for her unit in the whole -- I guess the whole post and she does her own newsletters and stuff and she would be more than happy to come forward and see if we want to do something through her. So I thought that was interesting.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: So are we at a standstill?

DEPARTMENT EDITOR AVINA: Oh, I'm sorry. Go like this. Oh, seriously, you can't hear me? I'm sorry. That's the voice that I use for the boys I take care of. I'm sorry.

Ruby, is that the way it comes in when you get the invoices? When they submit an invoice, do they -we're not paying for all the postage in that mailing. We just have our portion.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST CHAIRMAN WORKMAN: So we only pay for those who are our single Auxiliary members with no Legionnaire in the family; correct?

It would cost us about \$600 an issue. The biggest expense would be the mailing, and going through the mailing house would cost a minimum of \$4,000 per issue. Okay. And that is taking into consideration, and this is just for an Auxiliary newspaper, it's just taking into consideration 25 percent of the Auxiliary members don't have access to Internet and would not -- and would want a hard copy. Okay. So that's just 25 percent of our membership and it would cost us that much.

So I agree. I believe we should continue and figure out all avenues.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: The Chair recognizes Anita Biggs.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT BIGGS: Thank you, Harriet, for stepping aside so I can talk. No, I was just talking to our treasurer and, you know, we are assessed a dollar per member for our newsletter, our newspaper and that's 20 -- however members we have, 21,000 at least. So what Harriet was just stating is less than what we had been paying. So to me it's -- you know, you said 4,000 an issue. We don't have to have an issue a month. We can do it quarterly. You know, that's 16,000. So we have to think about what we've been paying versus what we haven't been paying and haven't been receiving, which is zero last year, and that the money is still being assessed to us

through membership to do this. So we need to come up with -- to me, we need to come up with a solution.

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I'm not against the motion because we do -- but we need to come up with something sooner than later. So that's all I have to say.

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Wendy? Terry Mikesell, District 2. In 2014-'15 we paid \$13,712.94. In 2015-'16, we paid \$22,816.19. So the problem is communicating with the Legion on how much it will actually cost us. And we did receive one issue last year.

DEPARTMENT EDITOR AVINA: And it wasn't -- also another problem we have, and someone may want to get to, is the fact that a lot of us that have husbands or sons, somebody else, a Legionnaire in the home, when it comes to our -- the issue that has our articles, we get two. How many of us can we get two to cop out -- yeah, opt out, opt out and decide not to get the paper through the mail. Get online. It's online. Whenever we have articles, it's on the Legion website, the articles, and you can download and read them or whatever. But it makes no sense to get two newspapers when we do our articles. And if you have two Auxiliary members in the home, sometimes they'll send you three which is another reason that we need to kind of -we're trying to get away where we can go down the line and see how many of us have husbands, sons, or whatever that are Legionnaires that get a newspaper at the same time we will get a newspaper. Because we don't need two.

Ellen Wallace, District 23, was appointed secretary. C.J. Reyes, District 19, offered prayer. And CeCe Harvey, District 13, was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. Meeting opened according to ritual. A total of 22 district delegates answered roll call. There were nine visitors present. The code was read and there were no code changes. Awards for 100 percent reporting went to the following districts: 1, 4, 5, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, and 29. A certificate of appreciation and participation and the second place awards were given in this committee.

The meeting convened of -- excuse me. It adjourned at 10:00 a.m. And this concludes the committee report. And, Madam President, may I continue with my supplemental and first place awards?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may.

LEADERSHIP CHAIRMAN WILLIAMS: Captain Wendy,
your Professors and Crew have successfully proven their
loyalty and shown their enthusiasm and commitment by
bringing Leadership training to the units and the
districts. Serving our veterans from sea to shining sea
while keeping your ship on course was Annapolis Academy's
goal. Twenty-two districts reported on Leadership
activities and 32 took and passed the National Certified
Leadership Test.

We chartered our sails to train and inform as many members as possible about the Auxiliary's great programs and how can they incorporate a strategic plan that will allow each member a chance to become knowledgeable leaders in their districts and units.

Two department workshops were held in California. The first workshop was held in southern California at the

1 Hollywood Post 43 on October 22nd, 2016 hosted by 2 Districts 23 and 24. There were 58 members present. 3 second was held in northern California at Post 521, 4 District 6 along with a junior workshop held in a separate 5 room led by Department Junior Activities Chairman. 6 Thank you, Captain Wendy, for sharing your time 7 and expertise with the other presenters at this workshop. 8 There were 60 seniors and seven juniors in attendance. 9 Both workshops provided excellent presenters whom gave 10 instruction about the basic programs: protocol, flag 11 etiquette, parliamentary procedures and civility training. 12 Members worked in groups to settle situations. 13 Fun games such as the Family Feud were a hit with the 14 participants. They answered questions regarding Membership and Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation programs. 15 16 Complimentary gifts were given to the participants. 17 Members reported the National and Department bulletins 18 were educational and interesting. Sixteen districts 19 reported holding training for their members and 40 units 20 held training. We will now have the report of the elections chairman, Jackie Cleveland, followed by the reading of the election rules by Glenda Schultz. Jackie Cleveland? Here she comes.

ELECTIONS CONVENTION REPORT

ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN CLEVELAND: Good morning. I will read the election rules. Number 25: Election of the Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance, National Candidate, Department Delegates and Alternates to the National Convention shall be held on Saturday morning, June 24th, 2017. The doors of the convention shall — shall be closed during the entire election procedure and no one shall leave or enter the hall until the Chair states the election is concluded. The exception to this shall be that in an emergency a member may leave, and if her absence accepts the voting strength, the District President shall immediately notify the presiding officer.

Number 27: When there is but one nominee for all department officers and but one nominee for Junior Member of Finance, the nominees shall be elected viva voce. (Article V, Section 3 Department Constitution). Upon roll call, the District Presidents shall report the number of units partially or wholly represented by newly elected delegates or alternates present in the delegation at the time of the roll call. This is to determine that there is a quorum of units present at the time of election.

Excuse me. Number 28: When there is more than one nominee for the Department Officers, Junior Member of Finance or endorsement for National Office, election shall be by written ballot. The District President shall, when they are instructed by the Chair, take a roll call of their respective delegation to ascertain the total voting

strength of their District for the election reporting the same to Chair.

4.5

Number 29: When there are three or more nominees for office, Junior Member of Finance, or endorsement for National Office, unless one nominee receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the nominee receiving the lowest number of votes shall be automatically dropped before proceeding with the next ballot.

Number 30: When there is a candidate or candidates for an endorsement to a National Office a majority vote shall be by ballot. (Constitution Article V, Section 13.)

Number 31: Each District President Or District Member of the Election Committee shall distribute and elect the votes cast by the District delegation and deliver them to the Department Chairman of the Elections.

Number 32: Department Officers, Chairman, Committee Member, and Past Department President shall vote with their respective district.

Number 33: Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote. The vote of an absent unit delegate not represented by an alternate shall be cast by the majority of the delegates from the Unit. When two delegates represent three votes, the Chairman of the Unit delegation shall cast the third vote.

Number 34: A majority of all votes cast shall elect except that in the election of national delegates or alternates of plurality shall elect.

Number 35: These Convention rules may be amended during the Convention by a two-thirds vote.

Number 36: Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised shall be the parliamentary authority on all points not covered by these rules, the Department Constitution & Bylaws and Convention mandates.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you, Jackie. Will the District Presidents please proceed to the microphone and line up in numerical order. Oh, yes.

Danielle White, can you please come to the podium. Where are you, Danielle? Here she is. Here she is. Okay. Okay. Can you give us the latest figures of the vote, please?

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Thank you. In keeping with Madam President's theme, "Serving Our Veterans From Sea to Shining Sea," we completed the year with 23 district reports including 13 with 100 percent reporting. Districts reported on several activities. Members continue to educate other members and the public on Poppy opportunities, reaching new goals and soaring to new heights.

Department of California members were in full swing during Poppy Month, May, keeping with the traditions of this great organization. Units continue to use the image and story of The Flanders Field Poppy to educate people about the sacrifices our veterans made, helping us raise awareness of the Legion Family and link us to our mission in the eyes of the public. Strategic Goal No. 5.

Units are reportedly participating in the Roadhouse Restaurant Poppy distribution and participating in the Poppy Poster Contest including posters completed at the Junior Conference in April. Forty-eight disabled or hospitalized veterans were tasked with producing Poppies under the direction of three Poppy production managers across the state, reporting a total dollar amount paid of \$26,490 to our veterans.

Members are seeking donations as well as giving Poppies to raise awareness. Many opportunities to increase Poppy revenue include donation request letters mailed to Auxiliary and Legionnaire members, community partners, and neighbors. Members solicited donations around their community by setting up tables at local storefronts, in restaurants, at their posts, and community events. Units invited board of supervisors, city mayors and councilmembers to proclaim the month of May as Poppy Month to bring further awareness to the community.

There were many opportunities to recognize those who made the ultimate sacrifice. Poppies were given to those attending events such as Memorial Day ceremonies, funerals of veterans, or Honor Flight World War II veterans. They were given Poppies upon their return from a visit to the memorial in Washington D.C. Poppies are included in sympathy, birthday, and get well cards and being wrapped around silverware at dinners and being tied around goodie bags.

Several units promoted the Poppy program in schools by reading the Poppy story to students and giving them a copy of In Flanders Field written by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae along with a handmade Poppy. Members attend patriotic programs in schools where they learn about the history of the Poppy or a 4-H club member creating a Poppy poster and reading In Flanders Field to fellow club members. Districts hold Poppy trainings

within their districts to continue to raise awareness.

There were many opportunities for units to raise awareness and educate their communities on the history of the Poppy. There was a small increase in the number of Poppy makers in our department. In addition to Poppy orders in the Department of California, Poppy orders were received from the departments of Idaho, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Unit increases are up 1,865. Total dollars reportedly spent by the Department of California members was \$32,811 and total volunteer hours donated was 597,441.

(Applause.)

 POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Units seek Poppy donations through request letters sent with a Poppy and Poppy Seals to community members. Oh, sorry. Sorry. Let me go here.

Okay. And Poppy Seals to community members and retailers, setting baskets full of Poppies near the Post sign-in book and preparing Poppy memorial wreaths, units create poster boards with the history and significance of the Poppy. Corsages, center pieces and Christmas wreaths are on display at posts, and distribution of Poppies and bookmarkers with In Flanders Fields are given during membership initiation ceremonies. Poppies are used at funeral settings and in memory of deceased veterans. And one member even used fresh Poppies in her wedding in memory of her grandfather who passed days prior. The Sunday — they were from my unit so it was a little extra special.

The Sunday before Memorial Day one unit reads In Flanders Fields to the congregation and presents all veterans and active duty service members with a poppy corsage. Then they take a group picture for public relations opportunities following the service.

Poppy donations are reportedly being used for the VA&R Fund, Patient Remembrance at the VAMC for holiday gifts for veterans and their families, adoption of a military family, infant layettes for active duty service members at two military installations, and clothes, toiletries and snack items for veterans who reside at assisted living homes.

One member wears a Poppy when she gathers with a group of veterans in her line of work. Another member puts a few Poppies on the local children dogs' collars while sharing the Poppy story. The children leave happy and shortly thereafter parents stop by and give donations and thank the member for being so kind to their children.

A National challenge was put out to members and chairmen to make and mail Poppy corsages to President Donald Trump. So I never saw him wearing any on Memorial Day or Poppy Day but, you know, hopefully he's learning

more about our organization through our efforts to educate him.

There are endless opportunities to promote Poppy revenue and raise awareness on the Memorial Flower of The American Legion. This chairman is pleased to report to you the wonderful activities that the Sea Flowers in Department of California members have participated in throughout 2016-2017.

One more accomplishment, and I can't remember the unit name or number or district, but there is almost a 90-year-old member up there and her -- she had been ill for the last couple of years, couldn't push Poppies. She ordered -- she wanted a thousand this year, so she pushed the thousand out with donations. Is that you guys? I knew you guys were over there somewhere. 377 in District 20. And then she ordered another \$1500. Her goal was to make, what, 3,000 -- \$7,000. She made 3,000 and then she just finished the year with just under \$8,000. So congratulations.

(Applause.)

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POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Happy to have her back. And I know the unit is very blessed to have her. So I am proud of all the accomplishments for our veterans, active duty service members, and their families. Promoting pride and belonging to the world's largest women patriotic organization begins right here with our own units.

Okay. Now for my first place awards. Best Overall Unit Supplemental, Judy Samples, Unit 256, District 25.

(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Best Overall District Supplemental, Dolly K. Smith from District 28.

(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Okay. Let's see. For the Poppy displays at the back, I have already put everything except for the first place awards on them, but the first place for the President's theme is Michelle Banks, Unit 751, District 25.

(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: And the Freestyle Based on Creativity and Originality, Karl Ross Unit 15, District 11.

(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Okay. The President's Choice. And I don't know. Do I have my Poppy production managers out there? I sent notes. If you're out here, Pat Alvarez, Lois Cornish.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: They're counting.
POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Can I present them their awards later? These are really nice. Well, they're

really nice though. I wanted to -- oh, anyway. Okay. I'll show you guys, but don't tell them.

Okay. And then the President's Choice, Madam President's favorite was Michelle Banks, Designer, Unit 751, District 25.

I know that there were a lot of posters that were brought in by convention, but I needed them by the district reporting so I could submit to Nationals, so -- I submitted to National by June 1st. So the winners for the Best Overall Class III, Grades 6 and 7, District 4, Andres Cervantes.

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: And they do receive a \$20 check as well. Thank you, Geri. And also for Best Overall Class VI, Grades 8 and 9, I have Asia Williams for District 233, District 6.

(Applause.)

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Okay. And all winners are posted -- will be posted right after this in the Department Convention Office. Madam Department President Wendy, thank you for this appointment. I have had a wonderful year and I'm honored to serve you and the Department of California. This concludes my report, Madam President. May this Chairman approach the podium?

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Yes, you may.
POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Here you go. So my
husband and I traveled across nine countries around
Thanksgiving. And I was at this antique store. And I
love antiques. I found treasures. And I found this
amazing set of Poppy cups, teacups. And I purchased like
16. I bought them all. But so all the gift bags do have
one included. I broke up the set. So I do have one as
well so you can recall remember this year with Poppies.
And also -- oops, I grabbed the wrong bag. Did I give

CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS AD HOC COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORT

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT MIKESELL: Madam
President Wendy, I present the members of this committee,
Terry Mikesell and Melanie Taylor. It was this
committee's intent to have the New Department
Constitution, Bylaws and Standing Rules ready to be voted
on at this meeting. Unfortunately, that has not happened.
Due to my illness, I realize that I was not able to make
the April deadline for Constitution & Bylaws changes to be
submitted to the Department Office. In addition, there
are a few items that need to be further researched before
we can move forward.

Our goal is to have a draft of the Constitution, Bylaws and Standing Rules ready for the DEC in January to be distributed for review and then voted on at the convention in Sacramento.

If anyone is thinking of making any changes to any existing documents, please advise us so we can work them into the new documents. One possible change is to make Second Vice President in the unit an optional office as many of the small units are having trouble getting enough officers to fill all the positions, especially since an officer can only hold one elected office at a time. A change for district officers not to be restricted to only holding one office whether elected or appointed is being considered, and the term of office of the National Executive Committeewoman is being discussed.

This is a very tedious process, so please let us know by November 1st of any other changes you might want to consider. We will be putting our full effort into getting this done by January.

FINANCE COMMITTEE CONVENTION REPORT

FINANCE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN MIKESELL: The Finance met on June 22nd, 2017 at 9:30 a.m. in the Raincross A of Riverside Convention Center. I should have changed that to 9:00 a.m. because we met early.

Linda Hayes was appointed Secretary, Brenda Preston offered prayer, and Linda Workman was appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. A total of 17 district delegates answered roll call. There were three visitors present. The committee agreed upon the following report: The code was read with no changes.

Madam Department President, by direction of the committee, I move adoption of nothing. Thank you. That concludes my report.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Okay. Ruby, do you have any communications?

SECRETARY/TREASURER KAPSALIS: None.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Oh, yeah, none.

Susie?

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Because we moved the banquet downstairs, anybody with a table number higher than 15, you're sitting in a new place because I

only have 15 tables down there and that's why I've been up here. My eyes are tired trying to figure out where to put people. But I do have lists of where you're going to be seated. Come look for me, but don't find me. And if I forget to turn the lights on a table display, will you turn them on for me, please? Thank you.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Thank you, Susie. Also we will be retiring the district colors tomorrow instead of today because we don't have to today.

All right. Now I am going to adjourn this -- okay. Susie wants to bring some information from National.

NEC MEMBER TOZIER: Ladies, it's going to be addressed. Ruby brought it up in her -- someone did in her presentation that they're talking about a rate increase of three cents. \$3. I'm sorry. I'll take the three cents. I'll take the three cents. No, \$3, and that will raise your dues. You'll have to send \$20 to Department and they'll take their share and National will take theirs.

I wanted to feedback from you because those of you who are going to be voting at convention. Personally I don't want it. The problem is membership is going down. They have -- they want to keep their existing staff so the costs are -- you know, they have their fixed costs and stuff like that. So as membership goes down, the costs are going to be still there. You're going to have to pay for it someway or another and that's how they're doing it is through the dues, so --

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT CHRISTNER: Madam President, Bonnie Christner, Past Department President. I don't know about you, ladies. I just -- because my membership is going down and we cannot survive on the money that we were making. I've already lost some of my ladies, older time ladies that have been members for years because I raised the dues \$5 in our unit. Now what's going to happen? Now at this rate they're going to raise our dues, and then I'm going to be in the same boat as I was before.

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: Madam Vice President Loretta Marsh, could you please take the station?

Okay. Ladies, I had a nice long weekend with our National President and we spoke about the dues increase. And really truly part of the issue, and I'm going to be frank with all of you, part of the issue is National wants to pay people to do what we are forced to have volunteers do.

I personally have told the National President that I do not think that this is good for our units. Our

units are struggling, our units have to get up and do all of the work that needs to be done. We collect all the money, we do all the things. Why can't National have volunteers come and take care of what they need to get done.

(Applause.)

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DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: And I am very happy to tell you the National President feels the same way.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT O'BRIEN: So I know that she has talked to lots of NEC asking them to really consider what is best. And then when we go, have an open mind to listen to what they have to say, but then know what's best for our units. And I — because I'm standing over here, I can say I personally do not think they need any more money at this time. Start getting volunteers to do what needs to be done. That is my personal opinion, and I'll share it with anybody that asks me. So anyway —

(Applause.)

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Does anybody else have any comments? I'm voting no. I know I'm voting no. I admit we have \$1 left from our dues and we raise our money by doing food for the bingos. That's how we raise our money. You know, so if that means we would have to raise our dues \$5 to cover that dues increase, I can't afford it. I'm like a lot of you. I'm on a fixed income and I pay several dues. It's awfully expensive, but we have to get the word out to the other delegates. And, you know, it's very hard. Everybody has to trim down, you know, and use the volunteers.

Our hospitals use volunteers. If they price the cost of the volunteers, just like they do the VA hospital, take all the hours and they price it out so they show the cost savings for the volunteers. So yeah, you are a very, very important person. You save the VA and the government a lot of money. So why can't National do that.

(Applause.)

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Are there -- yes.

POPPY CHAIRMAN VINCENT: Okay. I just want to say something. I was going to raise our dues to 25 and my unit decided, no, we're going to have another fundraiser to raise the money, that difference so we don't have to raise our dues. So that's what we did. We had another fundraiser that year and every year thereafter.

But also I wanted to say we're losing members no matter what. I mean, we're going to lose them if we raise the per capita or we're going to lose them if we don't. Yeah, we've all got to work. We've all got to work to

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renew our members and -- yeah. Thank you.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Are there any other comments?

DISTRICT 25 DELEGATE COPEN: Madam President, Pat Copen, incoming President of Unit 497, 25th District. This year I lost my husband. When I lost my husband, I lost \$1800 a month. Our organization is filled with volunteer senior citizens who are on fixed incomes, and when your spouse dies, you lose part of that income, yet every year they're raising everything: utilities, water, gas. This is a volunteer organization and it should be volunteer from the bottom to the top.

(Applause.)

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DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you.
DISTRICT 24 DELEGATE STEWART: Hi there. Rebecca
Stewart, District 24, Unit 43. This is an observation on
National. When we get the Auxiliary News magazine,
beginning — they usually show all the officers and
workers that are hired in National. And I don't know if
anyone's noticed it, but some of those individuals who are
workers, who are directors have an assistant. And the
assistant has an assistant. And the assistant has an
assistant.

Now National says they need people. They need the funds to help pay. They're paying for their office staff, for their workers, whichever they may want to call. And I would like to know when the National Executive Committeewomen from each state meet with the National office, do they ever make this observation to the board? And if so, it would be nice to say maybe if you let some of your workers, reduce your workers, it would help. And then to also understand that if, as you said, we are volunteers. They should have in their office volunteers as well. Observation.

DEPARTMENT VICE PRESIDENT MARSH: Thank you. (Applause.)

PAST DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT TOZIER: Usually corporations have budgets per departments and each department is only allotted so much money to spend and they have to decide -- you know, they have their wish list and you decide what you can have and what you can't have.

In regards to -- I heard rumors in February that they were thinking about doing this. The first time I really heard of it was when Ruby announced if the -- when they went to the leadership workshop, her and Loretta. So that was the first I ever heard about, you know, it was going to come out.
